Tips and Tales

I Put a Spell on You

Most of us haven't had a spelling class since elementary school, and thanks to technology, most of us don't need one. Nowadays we can get a quick and easy spell(ing) check right on-screen, and hey, there's always the dictionary (for the old-school folk). But spelling words correctly the first time is a mark of a rich vocabulary, and a rich vocabulary is a mark of a good communicator.

So, for your convenience, here are a few commonly misspelled words and some mnemonic tricks for remembering how to spell them correctly:

Accommodate: Save room to accommodate two Cs and two Ms, because that's what the word would want. And if you can't remember if it's an *a*, *e*, *i*, or *o* before the "date," then note how the double Ms are bookended by double Os.

Beautiful: Remember Jim Carrey in Bruce Almighty: "B-E-A-yootiful."

Business: Busi-ness because the workers are busy, as opposed to buisness ("bweez-ness"), which makes them sound French.

Conscience: If you can remember that the word "science" is spelled out completely, then you should be fine with this word and its derivatives (including *conscious* and *consciousness*, for both of which it's easy to forget the *s*).

Definitely: One of the easiest to mangle (we've all seen *definitly*, *definatly*, and, sometimes, *defiantly*), this word becomes less difficult if you can remember to always spell out *finite* in its entirety.

Liaison: If you tend to forget the second *i*, remember that the first one needs a

liaison (a helper, a buddy, a compatriot). It helps that the i's look a little bit like tiny people.

Loneliness: If you're inclined to drop the first *e*, remember that the word *one* is spelled out ("one" is the loneliest number, after all).

Misspell: Ironic, isn't it? But it helps if you can spot the complete word "miss"—as in, I don't want to "miss" the opportunity to spell this pesky word correctly.

Succeed: Remember that you want *more* if you want to succeed—in this case, more Cs and Es (two of each).

Weird: This word is weird because it doesn't follow the "i before e" rule.

Of course there are many, many more, and everyone's trip-up words are different. Fortunately, we're geeky about mnemonics here at KB COMM, so feel free to drop us a line and we'll gladly drop you a hint for remembering how to spell your problem word.
